Yesterday at Rimini the 10th regiment of H. was paraded, under the command of Lieutenant-Colonel Palmer, when the Sentence of the Court-Martial approved by the Prince Regent, was read.

The Prince Regent's levee. Yesterday His Royal Highness the Prince Regent held his first Levee on the Meeting of Parliament at Carlton House. At one o'clock, a guard of honour, commanded by Colonel Sutton, preceded by the band of the Coldstream regiment, in their new uniforms, entered the court-yard of Carlton House...

At three the Speaker of the House of Commons came in state, attended by the Sergeant at Arms, his Chaplain, Secretary, Train Bearer, Messengers, &c. followed by the Lord Chamberlain, Mr. Craik, the Mover and Second of the Address in that House, and a number of Members of the House, who were introduced to the Prince on his Throne by the Prince Regent.

The Prince Regent held the honour of being presented to General Sir John Cockerell, K. B. to his hands upon his return from the Cape of Good Hope, and on his appointment as the Right Honourable the Lord Chamberlain of the late King George IV. by the late King's Household.
