The persons who, by the Royal decree, are sentenced to banishment, or who desire to learn France, and are provided with passports, will be admitted in the Austrian, Russian, and Prussian dominions, upon the condition of never leaving the places assigned them for their residence.—But these persons cannot, under any pretext volutever, be allowed to live in Switzerland, in the smaller German States, or in the Nether-Lands.—(Varenderg Gazette, Spr. 22.).
