Amongst the passeagers were Captain Frager. The bodies were found next uno raing, that of the Captain and all the others in nearly a state of nodity; having had their clothes torn off by the violence of the sea, and were sadly bruised. A woman was picked up with her three young children clinging to her, and were led by her even when in the agonies of death—an indiant in her right arm, and the other two, apparently about five and three years old, holding by her legs, with her left arm about them.
